2. In cases of emergency, or if the needs of the solice require, and it is not practicable to employ subtutes, special clerks, clerks, and laborers in first arsecond class post offices * * * can be required twork in excess of eight hours per day, and for such over time service they shall be paid on the basis of the annual pay received by such employees. In computing the compensation for such overtime the annual salary or compensation for such employees shall be divided by throughout and six, the number of working days in the year less all Sundays and legal holidays enumerated in section 119 of this title, the quotient thus obtained will be the daily compensation which, divided by eight, will give the hourly compensation for such overtime service.

3. When the needs of the service require the employment on Sundays and holidays of foremen, special clerk clerks * * watchmes, messengers, or laborers of first and second class post offices, they shall be allowed compensatory time on one day within six days next succeeding the Sunday, except the last three Sundays in the calendar year, and on one day within 30 days next succeeding the holiday and the last three Sundays in the year on which service is performed: Provided, however. That the Postmaster General may, if the exigencies of the service require it, authorize the payment of overtime for service on the last three Sundays in the calendar year on Christmas Day in lieu of compensatory time. 4. Watchmen, messengers * * * in first and second class post offices shall be required to work not methan eight hours a day, and * * * the eight hours of service shall not extend over a longer period than tenconsecutive hours.

Laborers'

5. Laborers shall not be assigned to derical duties. The work to which laborers shall be assigned consists of loading and unlaw ing motor trucks, trucking mail in the office, setting up and taking down bag racks, dumping mail, unasing simple distribution of parcels by numbers where no scheff knowledge or reading of activesses is involved, operating canceling machines, cleaning on olling canceling machines, conveyors, etc., carrying mail from canceling machines to distribution cases and from letter drops to
