Dear Mr. Butchins:

On August 30, 1988, we met to discuss the above captioned grievance.

The issue in this grievance is whether a disabled veteran can be disciplined for using sick leave while receiving treatment at a VA hospital.

After reviewing this matter, it was mutually agreed that no national interpretive issue is present in this case. The parties at this level agree that Executive Order 5396, dated July 3, 1930, does apply to the Postal Service and that absences meeting the requirements of that decree cannot be used as a basis for discipline.

Accordingly, we agreed to remand this case to the parties at Step 3 for further processing, including arbitration if necessary.

Please sign and return the enclosed copy of this letter as your acknowledgment of agreement to remand this case.

Time limits were extended by mutual consent.

Executive Order

Special Leaves of Absence to be Given Disabled Veterans in Need of Medical Treatment

With respect to medical treatment of disabled veterate who are employed in the executive civil service of the United Makes, at is between medical numbered that, upon the presentation of an efficial statement from duly constituted medical authority that medical treatment is required, such annual or sick leave as may be permitted by law and such leave without pay as may be normary shall be granted by the proper supervisory effect to a disabled veteran in order that the veteran may receive such treatment, all without pountly in his efficiency rating.

The granting of such leave is contingent upon the veteral's giving prior notice of definite days and hours of absence required for medical treatment in order that arrangements may be made for carrying on the work during his absence.
